Purpose & Principles

Our core purpose is to provide full spectrum food aid to our community. Our programs not only alleviate the immediate and direct challenge of hunger, but work toward a more equitable and sustainable allocation of existing food already in our community, provide nutritional support in schools, and offer food and nutrition related education and resources for all members of our community.

We serve all individuals regardless of age, race, sexual orientation, gender identity, marital status, ethnicity, language, disability, or health status. COFB has created programs to inherently target assistance toward our seniors, children, infants, pregnant mothers, and those with medically diagnosed dietary needs and restrictions.

Central Okanagan Food Bank respectfully acknowledges that we operate on the ancestral, traditional, and unceded territory of the Syilx Okanagan people.

Organizational Scope

COFB serves the cities of Kelowna and West Kelowna. COFB is a proud member of Food Banks Canada, Food Banks BC, the Kelowna Chamber of Commerce, and the Greater Westside Board of Trade. In recognition of its outstanding impact, COFB has been named to Charity Intelligence's Top 10 Canadian Food Banks of 2024.

Year in Review

2024 has been a pivotal year for the Central Okanagan Food Bank. As our 40th year in operation serving the Central Okanagan region, this year has been a testament to the extraordinary resilience shown by our community in the face of ongoing challenges.

The rising cost of living remains the most pressing issue for many, pushing families and individuals to seek support in record numbers. This year, we experienced a 43% increase in the number of clients we served, reaching an average of 10,168 clients each month. This growth is particularly notable among low-wage, dual-income households, underscoring the economic challenges our community faces. Now, in November 2024, our client numbers are continuing to increase as we see more than 12,000 clients monthly.

To address these challenges, we've worked hard to strengthen partnerships at every level. Strategic collaborations with large farms have enhanced our capacity to store and distribute fresh, nutritious produce on a larger scale, while our work with local growers, such as Helen's Acres Community Farm, Vibrant Veggie, and Paynter's Market, has ensured consistent access to high-quality, locally sourced food for our hampers. Our Perishable Food Rescue program has grown by 17% from last year, thanks to both our local farms and retailers working with us to divert food from the landfill. All together, these partnerships are helping us nourish our community in impactful and sustainable ways.

2024 has also been a year of innovation. The expansion of our Food for Thought School Meal Program, which now serves 42 schools within school District 23, reflects our commitment to tackling food insecurity among children. At the same time, our developing More than Food Program empowers clients to receive food and nutrition related education, resources, and life skills that assist in finding stability amidst experiences of food and financial insecurity. We aim to provide well-rounded food aid that lifts up our community by offering resources and opportunities to build a more stable future.

As we expand, we've celebrated our evolution this year with a fresh rebranding to distinguish our identity and presence in the community. It is increasingly important to us that we evoke the warmth, clarity, and food aid purpose we provide as our reach increases. Looking forward, we're working on opening a second satellite location in downtown Kelowna and exploring spaces in West Kelowna to better serve our population.

None of our growth and impact would be possible without the unwavering support from our donors, corporate partners, and community groups. Their generosity upholds our purpose to feed hope and nourish community.

We are grateful for what we've achieved together in 2024. Let us continue to strengthen and build on this foundation in the years ahead.





FROM HUNGER TO HOPE

For 6 years, Chelsea, Eli, and their two children had been comfortable in their rented home in Kelowna. They were in a neighborhood they loved and the kids were doing well in their school- they were stable. But when the house was sold and they had to leave their rental, the family found themselves facing a housing market that no longer aligned with their budget.

When Chelsea and Eli first started looking for a new place to rent, they were shocked by the steep rise in rental prices. With no way to afford a similar home in their area where they wouldn't have to change schools for the kids, Chelsea and Eli signed a lease on a new rental that they knew was stretching their finances. "We thought we'd be able to make it work," Chelsea said.

It soon became clear that the higher rent was more than just a financial challenge- it was limiting their ability to cover other essentials. Despite their best efforts to budget carefully, the cost of rent, food, utilities, and everyday needs was unachievable. They couldn't seem to find a cheaper spot to rent for their family and were stuck in their too-expensive lease. Chelsea and Eli didn't want to fall behind on bills or cut food, but were in a tough situation.

The decision to go to the food bank wasn't easy. Like many, Chelsea and Eli didn't want to rely on external help. But when they received their first hamper from the Central Okanagan Food Bank, the relief was immediate. "It was such a huge weight lifted off our shoulders to see this box full of food for us," Chelsea says.



Food Aid:
Meeting the Immediate Need



Our Vitality program ensures families with children under 15 and senior clients receive balanced, essential nutrients. Clients are provided with dairy, seasonal produce, and high-protein items like meat, eggs, beans, lentils, legumes, and whole grains such as pasta and rice, promoting health and vitality for all ages.

This program supports 2,580 clients per month.

Dietary Packs



Clients with dietary needs due to medical conditions, including acute and chronic illnesses, eating disorders, and food allergies, receive tailored foods to support their health. We provide a range of immune-boosting, gluten-free, low-fat, low-salt, and sugar-free options, along with fresh produce, dairy, and protein to help them thrive.

This program supports 920 clients per month.

COFB ensures aid reaches shelter points and frontline responders within 24 hours of a declared emergency. Our robust infrastructure ensures we are capable of procuring, storing, and mobilizing resources swiftly to respond to situations in which the food supply chain is disrupted.

At least 650 emergency hampers are prepared at all times.

Children make up 44% of our client base. Each month, we provide over 500 Tiny Bundles Hampers and 2,500 Snack Packs to children in need.

Tiny Bundles




Tiny Bundles supports pregnant mothers and families with children under one year old. Clients receive monthly hampers and weekly supplements like fresh produce, milk, eggs, and cheese. After birth, they are provided with diapers, wipes, baby food, and formula. This year, we reintroduced Healthy Baby check-ins with Interior Health community nurses!

This program supports 120 families per week.

Our snack packs offer children and youth aged 1-15 a one-week supply of ready-to-go, healthy snacks perfect for preschool, daycare, or school. Each pack is filled with nutritious items like yogurt, cheese, fresh fruits and veggies, granola bars, and juice—all purchased items providing program consistency—ensuring kids have the energy they need to thrive.

This program supplies over 30,000 snack packs each year.

Holidays



Hampers are thoughtfully organized with all necessary items to prepare a special holiday meal for families, including our standard hamper items, plus turkey or ham, fresh seasonal produce, dairy, cranberry sauce, stuffing, jams, and desserts. There is a need for 30% more hampers this December compared to last year.

This year 4,622 Holiday Hampers were distributed.

This year, COFB launched the Food for Thought Program to provide nutritional support to children in School District 23 who would otherwise go hungry. Acquired from Hope for the Nations before the 2024-25 school year, we are continuing and growing this program’s legacy.

We understand the crucial link between proper nutrition and a child’s ability to focus on their studies, engage in activities, and thrive in their learning environment. Because every child is unique, each school prepares meals tailored to the specific requirements of its students.

At-Home Backpack Program

Outside of school, children in food-insecure households often don’t eat properly-or at all.

The Food for Thought Backpack Program provides food for children to take home and share with their families. You can help us feed hope to the impossible realities of hunger. It costs approximately \$30 to fill a child’s backpack with nutritious food for the weekend. We are looking to secure funding for the ever increasing requests for backpacks.

Well-nourished children have an equal chance to learn and succeed. This program ensures students are fed through the weekend so they can return to school on Monday with full stomachs.

Breakfast Program

Having a nutritious breakfast helps children reach their full potential. The Breakfast Program operates in over 40 schools in the Central Okanagan: in Lake Country, West Kelowna, and Kelowna.

BC has one of the highest child poverty rates in Canada with approximately 20% of children living under the poverty level. Our Food Bank plays a vital role, helping families who depend on school breakfast and snack programs to meet their child’s nutritional needs.

The Breakfast Program ensures that all students have reliable access to nutritious food in a safe and supportive environment. This has been shown to help positively impact health and learning.

Regional Hub Support:
Food Distribution

As a Food Banks Canada National Food Sharing Service Hub, we are part of a team of four distribution centres in BC that services regional catchments of outlying food banks.

Large case lot shipments of food are provided to the Central Okanagan Food Bank, which are broken down into more usable lots for smaller communities. These items are then shipped and shared out to 32 food banks across our region each month.*

Food Rescue Program

There is a surplus of food that ends up wasted across our community. Foods that are absolutely viable but exist in surplus or look imperfect. Without a Food Rescue Program in place, this food would be directed to landfills as it is often considered unsellable, but not because it is in any way inedible.

COFB collects both fresh and non-perishable food from local retailers and producers across Kelowna and West Kelowna daily. Our goal is to retrieve as much viable yet unsellable food as possible from the community in order to work toward a more equitable and sustainable allocation of this existing food within our community. We aim to prevent food waste before it happens.

After acquiring these foods, COFB sorts and redistributes to our clients, local partner agencies, and out to our designated hub region of Food Bank BC’s Associate locations.







LIFE SKILLS WORKSHOPS

Participants learn valuable skills such as cooking and nutrition classes, FoodSafe certification and culinary job training, and meal prep and grocery budgeting. These interactive sessions are led by experienced professionals.



PERSONALIZED NAVIGATION

Our program helps to provide clients with the resources necessary to address needs & goals. One on one navigation is available by appointment only.



REFERRAL NETWORKS

Our direct referral network aims to assist clients with understanding & finding different organizations in the community that are available for their specific needs.






What's next for COFB?
